'Orient Star' is taken from a Quarto sized ms. in our possession, originally owned, and probably written, by George Varah whose signature is on the inside back cover. It is thought probable that George came from the village of Wickersley, about 4 miles east of Rotherham, there being a family of stonemasons. Father George was born there in 1810, and his son, also George, in 1836. Recorded in
Drake's Rotherham and District Directory for 1862, George was the owner of a local stone quarry, and other members of the family are recorded there as stone masons, etc, up until 1905. The 1871 census records George. a quarry owner, as aged 61 . The manscript itself, together with a photograph of local bandsmen, was said by its vendor in 2005 to have been originally purchased at auction in Rotherham. It still smelled strongly of the talcum powder from the drawer in which it had been kept!

The music is unattributed, and the words underwritten in the first three lines of music suggest that the tune was used for the Advent Hymn 'Low he comes with clouds decending'. However, the tune name 'Orient Star' suggests that it may also have been used for an earlier hymn written by John Bowring and printed for him in 1825 by G Smallfield in Hackney, London. This was subsequently included in a publication by W P Kennedy entitled "Flowers of Zion: a selection of hymns and sacred poetry", Edinburgh 1845. In this setting, verse 1 is the opening verse of the traditional advent hymn, whilst the following three are those by Bowring. Sir John Bowring, KCB (17 October 1792-1872) was an English political economist, traveller, miscellaneous writer, polyglot, and the 4th Governor of Hong Kong.
