Samuel Stanley was born in Birmingham, 1767 (baptized 15 May); and died in Birmingham, 29 October 1822. He was a cellist and composer, and also led the choir at Carr's Lane Chapel, Birmingham, from about 1787 until 1818, when he and the congregation moved to the larger

Ebenezer Chapel in Steelhouse Lane. As a cellist he was in demand as a performer, playing in London at Vauxhall Gardens in 1792 and at the Birmingham Festivals of 1799, 1802 and 1817. He played in the Birmingham Theatre Orchestra, and was also sometime innkeeper of the Crown Tavern in Great Charles Street. The tune MERCY is taken from Stanley's Publication "Nineteen Psalm ... Tunes &c.", Banbury 1804.
