Brighton comes from Select Harmony, pub. 1833, and compiled by David Smith of Coseley, Staffs., where it is attributed to 'Nichols'. This is likely to be John Nicholls of Tipton, Staffs., who published his own collection of music 'Harmonious Strains', c.1835. Alto line originally an octave higher.
